Prints must be in place not later than 7:10 pm. Members in good standing may enter up to three images total in any three categories, with no more than two images in any one category, in accordance with BCC Competition Rules. Prints must be mounted and preferably matted. Maximum overall size for print and mount may not exceed 16"x20." Prints must also be labeled on the back with name, title, and category.

## **Competition Definitions:**

**People in Water:** Your image should show a person or people interacting with water, enjoying water, or having another meaningful connection to water. Water setting can be natural such as in oceans, rivers, streams, or within constructed environments such as pools, bathtubs, sinks, cups etc.

**Still Life:** Your photo should be a depiction of inanimate subject matter, typically a small group of objects with specific emphasis on composition, framing, form and light. No humans. For inspiration check out:

My family has been involved in the arts for several generations. One of my grandfathers was the painter John Graham, who was active in the art scene in New York in the 1930s. My other grandfather collected the works of the Danish Impressionists for what is now the Glypotek Museum in Copenhagen, Denmark. Growing up surrounded by these wonderful works of art, I took lessons in drawing and painting from a very early age.

I graduated from Pratt Institute of Art in 1973. After working as a photographer's assistant in New York, I moved to Boston to study art therapy, leading to a career in psychology.

I came back to photography with the advent of digital cameras in 2002. I am a member of the Duxbury Camera Club, and have served on the steering committee and as a club officer. In 2013 I became a gallery artist for the Plymouth Art Guild. I am also a founding member of the Images Group. As a result of taking workshops with Lance Keimig and Kevin Adams, I became increasingly fascinated with night photography. I am now the coorganizer of the Greater Boston Night Photographers.

My work has been published in South Shore Living, Early American Life, and in AAA's Horizons. Online publications and awards include a NASA Astrophotograph of the Day, and and inclusion the the "100 Best Astrophotographs of 2016" on <u>Space.com</u>.

In 2016 I co-curated an exhibit "Night Becomes Us" at the Art Complex Museum in Duxbury. My work was shown along with the work of 11 other night photographers, from 9/2016 through 1/2017.

# **Education - Breaking Ground: A Documentary Talk with Valery Lyman - Tuesday, October 30**

Time: 7 - 9:30 pm, Dining Room at All Saints Parish



Valery Lyman spent nearly 5 years photographing and recording audio in the Bakken region of North Dakota, documenting the rise of the oil industry there and the large American migration that went along with it. She has likely compliled the most comprehensive visual-aural archive of this particular time and place in American history. \*Breaking Ground\* is a series of site specific installations in which these photographs are projected onto large industrial remnants while sound composi-

tions emanate from different areas of an exhibition site, creating a meditation on the cyclical nature of industrial booms and an immersive opportunity to explore what is occurring in North Dakota now. She will share

her experiences at the Bakken oil fields, some elements of her documentary approach, and discuss why she has chosen to present this material in such an unconventional manner. A lively Q&A with the audience is hoped for and encouraged.

Valery Lyman has an extensive background in documentary film, working for 15 years as a sound recordist, cinematographer and director. She was a location sound-mixer on films for 4 years, mastering what she felt was an underrated yet crucial element of filmmaking. She went on to become the Director of Photography for numerous independent documentary film and television works. Lyman's directorial debut, \*One of These Mornings\* (2010), a film portrait of the 2008 election narrated by voicemail messages from

voters across the country, was exhibited in the Museo Nazionale delle Arti XXI Del Secolo in Rome in 2014.





# Member Profile: Paul McLaughlin

## When did you join the club? How did you hear about the club?

I joined the club in November of 2017. At the time I was preparing to retire, and I wanted to reactivate my interest in photography, which had been pretty much dormant for thirty years. I found the club on the internet and feel very

lucky that it was the BCC that I contacted and joined.

## What skill level would you use to describe yourself?

My skill level rests between beginner and intermediate. I am

finding that there is so much





more that goes into a strong photograph than I originally understood. My composition skills could certainly be stronger, my original photographs tend to contain a lot of clutter, and I need to be more disciplined in framing the image, I am certainly a beginner in the area of processing and have benefited greatly from input, instruction, and advice from other members.

## What/where is your favorite local spot to photograph?

I find the Blue Hills, local beaches, and sites like the quarries in Quincy offer a lot of opportunities for me and are only ten minutes from my house.

## What is your favorite subject/genre to photograph?

I enjoy topics and subjects that convey a mood. I am particularly interested in old, abandoned structures and walls. I also like seascapes, landscapes, and urban scenes.

## What is your favorite regular BCC program?

I really enjoy the competitions. I like to see the criteria used by the different judges in their evaluation of images, and I enjoy measuring my own work against others. I particularly like the fact that the competition categories get me out of my comfort zone and photographing new types of images.

## What was the best single program/event you have attended?

I have enjoyed all of the programs that I have attended. I have



found the competitions to be very enlightening and the informal critiques very insightful. Overall, every program has been helpful in some form.



## What skills do you need to work on?

I need to work on my composition and thinking through the image before actually take a photograph. I also need to improve my processing and editing skills (many thanks to Yair Egozy for his help in this area).

## Any other relevant information?

I am either still new enough not to have my own style, or I am not experienced enough to identify it. Over time I would like to see my im-

ages develop a maturity that reflects a greater understanding of photography and the skills it requires.

# Member Travelogue: Burkina Faso and the panAFRICAproject

## Reported by Lou Jones; photography by Lou Jones.

About five years ago my studio embarked on an overly ambitious long term self assignment: <u>www.panAFRI-</u> <u>CAproject.org</u> with the sole intent to photograph the 54 countries in Africa. So far we are working on number twelve. I have taken pictures in Egypt, Senegal, Tanzania, Ghana, Namibia, Ethiopia, Swaziland, Lesotho, South

Africa & Morocco. For this travelogue I will talk about our process using Burkina Faso as metaphor.

Because western media promulgates such a stilted, uninformed image of the continent and the teaching in our schools is simply a cartoon, we are attempting to show a much more realistic portrait and eradicate some of the myths that obscure information about contemporary life. Instead of poverty, pestilence, and conflict, we seek to let the universal language of photography shed light on the fastest growing populations on the planet.

For each country my assistants and I do prodigious research before we





depart, talking to anyone who has connections in our intended destination. But the real work is done once we arrive. Since we rarely utilize anything but local peoples or organizations, much of the information is based on what is important to natives, what makes their country unique from their point of view and what is significant in their voice rather than tourist guidebooks.

The algorithm that leads us to the next subject is complex. Burkina Faso was chosen because we try to alternate well known places with more obscure ones to insure we cover Africa without overemphasizing popular, overly exposed ideas. We had to wait two years to "revisit" Burkina Faso because it hosts FESPACO, the largest film festival in that part of the world. This is a big deal and we applied for press credentials to cover the festivities.

We are highly mobile and travel tremendous distances around the countryside by public transportation, car, boat and taxi, often sharing space with produce and

livestock. My crew stays in small, locally owned hotels, hostels and guest houses. We have slept on the floor of dung huts and on the couches of friends we have met. In Ethiopia I put my 5-person crew (two assistants, driver and translator) up in a motel that cost the equivalent of \$7 a room.

Since we investigate every aspect of the modern and traditional society, we start with a colonialistic list of subjects: industry, education, entrepreneurship, health care, tribes, media, art, but that has evolved to a more enlightened amalgamation of internal systems. We have learned to reject NGOs and FBOs. They have too much



agenda. We also only

use tour guides to take us around to attractions on the first day or two. Meeting politicians, businesspeople, chiefs, traditional doctors takes us deeper into the fabric. We learn far more that way. Each country has its own personality. Some places are easier to photograph than others. Once we have "boots on the ground" we have to quickly decipher attitude and insinuate myself into the lives and trust of diverse institutions, individuals, people on the streets and important ideologues. We carry a fair amount of equipment to document what we see, including lights, stands, batteries, computers, etc. And I post significant images every night so that

interested parties can follow our journey on social media (in those places that have WIFI). We are redesigning the website now in order to make out outreach more interactive for schools, associations, companies and historians - <u>www.panAFRICAproject.org</u>. 

#### Valensole, France - David Long

The technical specs are 400 ISO, F20, 24mm at .3 seconds. Shot with a Canon Mark IV with a Canon 24-105 L series lens. It was on a tripod with no filters. Processed in LR. Very little processing. Boosted the clarity a little, used a grad pull down to darken the sky and added a little saturation to the lavender. I have shot this field and barn before and was trying to get a different perspective with more focus on the lavender and the leading lines into the distant barn in order to convey the immense size of the fields in this area of France. It was planned and I think the shot at dawn worked out well in terms of the



light on the lavender. The shot was done at sunrise which was about 6 am and was done before the sun hit the field so we had the soft morning light without the shadows. The shot was in Valensole France on July 6 of this year.

## Open B Winners 1st Place

#### Lincoln in Library - Suki Hanfling

This photo was not at all planned, but discovered as I walked around looking for interesting photos to shoot. It was less than 1/3 of the entire photo that I took on Aug. 22, 2017 at 2:50 PM, inside a window of a library in Stockbridge, MA. It is an attempt to not only show what is inside the room, but also some of what is reflected behind me.

My camera is a relatively new Nikon D7200 and I always use my Nikon telephoto DX 55-200 mm f/4-5.6 lens since both are so light. Because I hate carrying anything besides my camera, I never use a tripod even though I know that my photos would be less grainy if I did. My ISO was 3200, I shot at 100 mm, 1/125 s at f/16.



In addition to cropping the photo a great deal using Light Room, I increased the exposure, contrast, clarity, vibrance and saturation somewhat, and added some brush strokes to bring out the statue of Lincoln. Often I do more work in LR but in this instance I wanted the photo to look as realistic as possible while at the same time showing the effects of the reflecting glass windows. I have tremendous admiration for Lincoln and was delighted when I was able to include "him" so to speak, in my photo.

#### A Boy and His Dog, Sleeping - Erik Gehring

This image was taken in August of this year with my iPhone X: ¼ s, f/1.8, ISO 250, handheld. Converted to B&W using Lightroom CC and Silver Efex Pro 2.
