Latimer Print Competition – Tuesday, March 7

Submission deadline: Saturday, March 4, 11:30 pm

Social time, setup & hang prints: 6:30 - 7:10 pm

Voting: 7:10 – 7:30 pm

Judge's presentation and critique: 7:30 pm

Categories: Open A; Open B; Abstract; Houses of Worship

Prints must be in place not later than 7:10 pm. Members in good standing may enter up to three images total in any three categories, with no more than two images in any one category, in accordance with BCC Competition Rules. Prints must be mounted and preferably matted. Maximum overall size for print and mount may not exceed 16"x20." Prints must also be labeled on the back with name, title, and category.

Competition Definitions:

Abstract: Abstract photography is a means of depicting a visual image that does not have an immediate association with the object world and that has been created through the use of photographic equipment, processes or materials. An abstract photograph may isolate a fragment of a natural scene in order to remove its inherent context from the viewer, it may be purposely staged to create a seemingly unreal appearance from

real objects, or it may involve the use of color, light, shadow, texture, shape and/or form to convey a feeling, sensation or impression.

Houses of Worship: For this category, any building seen from the interior or the exterior, which is a central theme in the image, will qualify. The building should be a place where people come to worship (in a religious sense). If the interior of the building is shown the image should do more than focus on one window or a pulpit--the expanse of the interior should be shown. One or more people can be in the image.

Judge: Sirapi Heghinian Walzer



Sirarpi's artwork is in many collections nationally and internationally. She has received awards and exhibited her work in galleries throughout Europe and the United States. She lives and works in Lexington, Massachusetts.

Sirarpi is represented by FAFINEART, Gallery263 and Gallery Z. She serves on the boards of Cambridge Art Association and Non-Profit Net in Massachusetts. She is the principal of Consult and Design, a small-business IT consulting firm. She is the co-founder and director of Art Without Borders, an online community that champions the rights of artists.

In Europe, Sirarpi has worked with artists Andrej Woron, Milan Knížák, and Peter Erskine, and in the USA, with Timothy Harney, Jon Imber and Ati Gropius. As an engineer at Biotroniks in Berlin, Germany, her team designed pacemakers. At Honeywell in Lexington, MA, she worked on infrared imaging systems.





Education Night with Steve Dunwell: Tuesday, March 28 Above Boston





Steve Dunwell has been fascinated by our skylines for decades. Enthralled with weather and clouds, he uses aerial views to reveal the urban landscape. His ex-

hibit "Above Boston" is currently showing at Trinity Episcopal Church in Concord (. Featuring images taken from helicopters, rooftops, decks, piers and bridges, this work covers decades of close observation of the City on the Hill.

This presentation at Boston Camera Club will describe the back story of this endeav-

or, and will highlight some of Steve's favorite techniques, including the benefits of returning frequently to certain photogenic locations. Steve will show and discuss his aerial photo work, and review strategies for getting best quality results – in the air and on the ground.

Dunwell studied under Walker Evans at Yale and has published over a dozen photographic books. He has been teaching Digital Photo Academy workshops since 2007, and also has taught at the New England School of Photography. He has been a judge and speaker at many camera clubs in the Boston area.

To participate in the competition, you MUST

1. Submit a .JPG of your book's cover to the Photobook competition via the web site by 6 pm that Tuesday: https://www.bostoncameraclub.org/Competitions/SubmitImageToCompetition.aspx#no-back-button

2. Deliver your printed book to President Beth Luchner on or before that Tuesday. Beth will be available at all the club's events to accept your printed books. If you're unable to deliver your photo book at one of the scheduled BCC events, please email her at bethluch@gmail.com to make other arrangements.

Rules for BCC Photo Book Contest

This contest will be open to any subject matter. Books can be photos only or with text that tells a story. Only printed books will be accepted, no digital or PDF or Viewer type books allowed. There are no restrictions on using winning images from regular BCC competitions, and there are no size restrictions, any size book will be considered. Books may be hard or soft bound and limited to 60 pages, 30 pieces of paper with each side considered a page. There is no rule on type of paper, glossy, matte or luster. All the photographs in the book must have been taken by you; you can

not combine your photos with another photographer's images. Any book received that does not meet these rules will be disqualified.

Judging Criteria for the BCC Photo Book Contest (PSA rules):

- Does the cover draw you into the book wanting to see more?
- Does the cover represent what the book is about?
- Does text on the cover fit with the image?
- Normal considerations for images used in the book. Are they sharp, correctly exposed, color balanced and meet all the criteria of any normal photo competition.
- Do the images and/or text flow from page to page in a pleasing sequence?
- Does the book have a theme or story that is carried through the book?
- Does the text add to the book?
- Is the font used pleasing and go with the subject matter?
- Are there any typographical errors?
- Is the placement of text and images pleasing in the layout?
- Is the subject or topic well covered in the book?
- In an art book or picture book, does it cover the theme without words and stand on its own?
- Is the layout pleasing? Is placement of text and images pleasing?
- Do captions make sense and add to the book?
- For story or travel books, does the text tell the story and add to the images?
- For text books, does the text with images tell how to do something and increase your understanding of the subject?

Member News Member Profile: Will McMullen

When did you join the club?

I first heard of the Boston Camera Club in the spring of 2013. I was shooting birds feeding at the Watertown Dam when one of the club members struck up a conversation with me and invited me to join the club. I had been exploring photography for the past ten years or so and wanted to join the club in 2013. However, it wasn't until the fall of 2015 that my Tuesday nights opened up and I could attend club meetings.

What skill level would you use to describe yourself?

I think of myself as a beginning-intermediate photographer. I feel I have a good command of the exposure triangle and my ability to read light levels is coming along but very much a work in progress. While I'm drawn

to the more technical side of photography, it's the emotional expression one can achieve that hooked me. I love the way a picture can evoke feelings and meanings in others that gives me a glimpse of how they see their world. I think I'll always feel like a "beginner" as I can't imagine ever feeling like the pictures I take capture all that I saw/felt at the time I took the shoot.

What/where is your favorite local spot to photograph?

My favorite spot to photograph is along the Charles River. After dropping my wife off at work, I like to walk along the river, between the Eliot Bridge and the Arsenal Street Bridge or I'll be at the Watertown Dam. I've been to these spots too many times to recall but there's always something new to see and the scene is never the same.

What is your favorite subject/genre to photograph?





l enjoy exploring and shooting just about anything that

catches my attention and can't say what my favorite subject is to shoot. I do enjoy shooting birds (raptors in particular) in flight, landscapes and water scenes. I'm very interested in astrophotography but I've not found the time to pursue it. Astrophotography is a big part of my bucket list and I'm looking forward to retirement and chasing the night sky.

What is your favorite regular BCC program?

It's hard to pick a favorite BCC program. I really enjoy the guest

presentations, the photo critiques and the Latimer competitions. Unfortunately, the last two years of my teaching schedule has prevented me from being able to attend club meetings regularly. Hopefully, I won't be teaching Tuesday nights next year and can make more of the club's meetings.

What was the single best program/event you have attended?

My favorite event was the Newport Rhode Island workshop with Onne van der Wal. Being on the water, in a lovely setting, and being able to share it with my brother made it a very special day for me. Shooting the super moon at the reservoir was fun. Life demands have prevented me from taking advantage of many of the field trips the club sets up but I'll attend as many as I can.

What skills do you need to work on?

I'm working on two things, learning about the behavior of birds and improving my ability to match exposure setting with light levels. I'm learning about bird behavior in order to better anticipate what they will do. Knowing the

habits of the birds that I like to shoot (mostly raptors) will help

me to capture more of the personalities of these majestic birds. I also want to get better at setting my initial exposure based upon the quality and quantity of light. I find myself either over or underexposing shots. Consequently, I'm often "chimping" my shots and while, doing so, missing other shots. I hope to get good enough at setting up my exposure that I can keep my eye on the action and not have to check my exposure on the back of the camera.

Member Travelogue: The Real Sihanoukville

It boasts miles of continuous beach and large volcanic rock to climb on. The turquoise water is warm enough to swim in the entire day. Looking out into the vast Gulf of Thailand, tropical islands dot the horizon. The city is named after King Norodom Sihanouk. Read or listen to this <u>NPR article</u> to learn more about him.

Cambodia is full of natural and manmade treasures. A natural example is the wild fruit that grows everywhere. An example of

manmade masterpieces are the temples that were erected during the Khmer Empire, which ruled for over 600 years and who had immense power, wealth, and stunning artistic and architectural achievements.

However, it is also a country still recovering from a horrific genocide that took place from 1975-1979. It has widespread poverty and is rife with corruption.

Beyond the beautiful white sand beaches and luxury hotels of

Sihanoukville lies a fishing village. This is the real Sihanoukville.

On our second day in the resort city, my friends and I went for a walk. We climbed volcanic rock, dug our feet into the hot sand, and bought bags full of chopped pineapple with long toothpicks to help us select pieces without a mess. I adhered the bag to my purse and trekked the beach.

The landscape began to change from luxury hotels to natural



palm trees. Little boys

flew their kites and curiously followed us. Finally we came upon a small town that showed a drastically different picture from the area we were staying in. Seeing this town was actually one of my favorite days. It was eye-opening to view a way of life I was unaccustomed to.

Somehow, I felt inspired seeing everyone working with their hands. A little ways past the village, my friend found some coconuts. Hungry and without a knife, I decided to attempt opening my coconut on rocks. I began striking the coconut on the jagged edge. Slowly



Taken with a Sony A6000 camera with a 35mm lens (E 35mm F1.8 OSS). 1/1600 sec at f/1.8, ISO 100.

I adjusted my photograph in Lightroom and then brought it into Photoshop. I amended it to be black and white with sephia tone.

This was taken in early November in Chinatown at 1pm on a sunny day. The first thing that caught my eye was the dappled light coming through the trees. The light led straight to my subject, a group of people who were playing board games and cards in a park. Some people were standing around, talking in groups. Others were enjoying cigars. The community feel is what struck me. I was curious to see



what was happening at a particular table because no one was talking and they were completely focused on the middle of the table. I realized they were all waiting for the man in the hat to make his next move. I wasn't sure how the group would react to me, but everyone was so intent on seeing the next move that they didn't even notice me until I motioned to see if I could photograph them. I asked the man next to me, whose left shoulder leads you into the main subject, what the game was. He didn't speak English so I never found out. I liked the intensity of everyone in that moment. This pensive mood is why I changed the photograph to black and white.

This photo was taken in the Los Angeles Cloud Forest in Costa Rica, which is smaller but more accessible than the better-known Monteverde Cloud Forest. We stayed for a couple of hours and took a guided walk through the forest. I was struck by how the fog added depth to the scene, and when I came to this place where I could see the holes in the silhouetted leaves, I had to find a way to use them in a photograph. The way everything was backlit, monochrome was a natural choice for presenting the image. This shot was taken in midafternoon, but with the fog it could really be any time of the day. Technical details: 1/160 sec at f/4, ISO 200, and 70 mm focal length on an APS-C Canon digital camera (1.6x crop factor), processed with Adobe Lightroom 3.

I shot this at the New Hampshire Ice Castles in Lincoln, NH. I knew there would be an opportunity to capture interesting lighting because this location has colored lights embedded within the ice. I shot this handheld at 1/40sec at f/3.5, ISO 1600, 18mm with my Nikon D7000 with an 18-55mm f/3.5-5.6G VR (kit lens from the D60). No tripods were allowed here so I was shooting at a very high ISO and was frustrated by the digital noise. Coincidentally, my girlfriend was taking some photos with her iPhone, when she accidentally set the camera to rapid fire and shot off about 15 images. This immediately gave me the idea to stand very still, fire off some quick shots, then stack them in photoshop and use image averaging to eliminate the digital noise from the high ISO. Without her accident, this image would not have the clarity that it does.



Join Paul Nguyen and Allie Richards of BlueHour Photo Ventures to witness one of the east coast's truly unique natural spectacles: The annual spawning of the horseshoe crabs. Every Spring, during the highest tides of the full moon and new moon, horseshoe crabs come up on the sheltered beaches of the Delaware Bay by the tens of thousands to lay their eggs in the sand.
